

10730NAT Certificate IV in Spoken and Written English for Further Studies



DESCRIPTION

10730NAT Certificate IV in Spoken and Written English is an advanced English language course designed to prepare learners for academic studies. Graduates will be able to use a broad range of language, learning and study skills to participate in complex academic education contexts. Graduates will be able to produce high level responses to assignments that conform to academic principles of acknowledging the work of others and avoiding plagiarism. They will also be able to independently analyse, compare and integrate information from a range of sources into their spoken and written work. Their English language speaking and listening skills will enable them to actively participate in tutorials, lectures and presentations and they will have developed the ability to read and understand a range of complex texts. Graduates will use critical thinking skills to analyse information and apply solutions to problems they encounter.

ELIGIBILITY/ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

To enter 10730NAT Certificate IV in Spoken and Written English for Further Study candidates undertake a 1 hour to 1.5-hour pre-course interview.

The recommended entry point against the ISLPR® scale is 3 across the four macro skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing.

2019 FEES

Fees can vary according to which category a student enrolls. The fee will be determined by an educational advisor prior to enrolment in the program.

The following guide can be used to determine fee categories:

- Free: Students who at the time of enrolment receive a Centrelink Benefit
- Free: Permanent residents with evidence of refugee or humanitarian status
- Domestic students – VET tuition fees - \$3.20 per enrolled hour. The maximum VET tuition fee is \$1 792.00 based on 560 enrolled hours.
- Temporary visa-holders (e.g. 457):
 - Main visa holder - International student fees - \$19.17 per enrolled hour. The maximum international student fee for this course is \$10 735.20 based on 560 enrolled hours
 - Dependant - VET fees - \$3.20 per enrolled hour. The maximum VET tuition fee is \$1 792.00 based on 560 enrolled hours

STUDY AND CAREER PATHWAYS

10730NAT Certificate IV in Spoken and Written English for Further Study is a component of the Certificates in Spoken and Written English (CSWE), English as an additional language curriculum framework.

It prepares learners for entry into vocational training or higher education at AQF 4 or above.

There are no formalised articulation arrangements in place for this qualification.

QUALIFICATION CONTENT

To achieve a qualification a total of six (6) units of competency must be completed comprising one (1) core unit and (5) elective units. One (1) elective must be chosen from Group A, the remaining four (4) elective units can be selected from any group, a maximum of one (1) unit may be chosen from Group C as detailed in the packaging rules and listed below. The electives have been selected and are highlighted below. The units have been selected that best suit learners going into a further studies context.
