

CHC43315 Certificate IV in Mental Health



DESCRIPTION

This qualification covers workers who provide a range of community services focusing on:

- rehabilitation and support for people affected by mental illness and psychiatric disability
- implementing community-based activities focusing on mental health, mental illness and psychiatric disability
- mental health promotion work.

Work may focus on engaging people with mental illness in community participation, prevention of relapse and promotion of recovery through programs such as residential rehabilitation, work in clinical settings, home-based outreach and centre-based programs delivered by community-based non-government organisations. This work may also involve supported employment and programmed respite care.

This qualification defines the knowledge and skills required by support workers and case workers who work autonomously under broad guidance and refers to specific knowledge of mental health issues and appropriate intervention processes applied in residential and community-based settings.

For students not already employed in the sector, work placement of at least 80 hours will be required in order to meet the evidence requirements of many of the units.

Infection control, including COVID-19 measures and the associated restrictions, have been implemented, to ensure the safety and well-being of students, lecturing staff and the wider community.

ELIGIBILITY/ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

There are no mandatory entry requirements for this qualification. However, applicants who wish to commence this course need to have the required skills and knowledge to undertake the qualification at this level; e.g. completion of Year 10 or equivalent, and a general command of spoken and written English, to be able to meet industry standards for communication.

Generally, candidates will require evidence of the following for work placement: -

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2021 FEES

The 2021 indicative fee for this course is \$3,167.50 for students who are eligible and receive a NT Domestic Subsidised place or \$15,385.00 for Domestic Full fee places. Actual fees will vary according to your choice of units.

ASSESSMENT

Assessments vary with each unit. You will be provided with an assessment guide.

WORK PLACEMENT

For candidates not already employed in the sector, work placement of at least 80 hours will be required in order to meet the evidence requirements of many of the units. Candidates will be issued with a placement logbook to record activities and evidence gathered.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, if work placement is able to go ahead, the students will follow Australian Government advice regarding social distancing, personal hygiene, and when and how to isolate during the COVID-19 pandemic. If voluntary placement is unable to be taken at this time, it may be deferred.

RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING (RPL)

Students can apply for RPL during pre-enrolment or after enrolment. Students have an initial interview with an assessor and are then provided with an RPL application form and a self assessment document.

RESOURCES

Students are issued with learning materials and handouts relevant to each unit via an online LMS.

STUDY AND CAREER PATHWAYS

The role of mental health workers is to provide self-directed recovery oriented support for people affected by mental illness and psychiatric disability. Work may include counselling, referral, advocacy and education/health promotion services. Work is undertaken in a range of community contexts such as community-based nongovernment organisations; home-based outreach; centre-based programs; respite care; residential services; rehabilitation programs; clinical settings; or supporting people in employment.

Candidates who have obtained this level qualification could progress into Diploma Level qualifications in Community Services or other related fields in the VET sector. There is often credit or advanced standing given to Higher Education courses for students who have successfully completed this training, but this is at the discretion of the higher education provider. Please contact the higher education institution for advice. This training would give students an understanding plus skills and knowledge to undertake higher level qualifications and training options with a higher education institution.

- community rehabilitation and support worker
- community support worker
- mental health rehabilitation support worker
- mental health support worker
- mental health outreach worker
- alcohol and other drug (AOD) worker.

QUALIFICATION CONTENT

To achieve a CHC43315 Certificate IV in Mental Health, a total of fifteen (15) units of competency must be completed comprising eleven (11) core and four (4) elective units as detailed in the packaging rules and listed below. The electives offered may vary between campuses.
