

AHC21216 Certificate II in Rural Operations

DESCRIPTION

This qualification provides an entry point for students interested in joining the northern pastoral industry. As such, no previous experience in the pastoral or rural industries is required.

Depending on the units selected individuals can be employed not only in rural industries but also in other rural and regional sectors, such as local government, tourism, hospitality, transport, construction, community services, information technology, and metals.

Industry expects individuals with this qualification to carry out routine tasks under general supervision and exercise limited autonomy with some accountability for their work.

No occupational licensing, legislative, or certification requirements apply to this qualification at the time of publication.

ELIGIBILITY/ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

A Language, Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Literacy (LLND) evaluation helps identify any areas where you may need additional support to help you achieve your goals.

To gain entry into AHC21216 Certificate II in Rural Operations candidates require:

- To be physically fit, active, and able to function effectively in a tropical environment, as this is a physically demanding course; and,
- students must have a work contract with an approved employer to undertake a traineeship.

RESOURCES

Students are issued with CDU logbook and a set of Study Guides for the applicable units/clusters. Students may also access the internet to conduct their research, although this is often difficult on remote stations. Most of the learning occurs on-station during day-to-day work activities.
