CHC43315 Certificate IV in Mental Health

DESCRIPTION

This qualification reflects the role of workers who provide self-directed recovery-oriented support for people affected by mental illness and psychiatric disability. Work involves implementing community-based programs and activities focusing on mental health, mental illness, and psychiatric disability.

Work is undertaken in a range of community contexts such as community-based non-government organisations, home-based outreach, centre-based programs, respite care, residential services, rehabilitation programs, clinical settings, or supporting people in employment.

Work is carried out autonomously under the broad guidance of other practitioners and professionals.

To achieve this qualification, the candidate must have completed at least 80 hours of work as detailed in the Assessment Requirements of units of competency.

No licensing, legislative, regulatory, or certification requirements apply to this qualification at the time of publication.

This course can be undertaken as a traineeship. Visit <u>TAFE Apprenticeships and Traineeships</u> for more information.

ELIGIBILITY/ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

There are no mandatory requirements; however, candidates who wish to commence this course need to have the required skills and knowledge to undertake the qualification at this level, e.g., completion of Year 10 or equivalent and a general command of spoken and written English to be able to meet industry standards for communication. A pre-assessment may be required.

A Language, Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Literacy (LLND) evaluation helps identify any areas where you may need additional support to help you achieve your goals.

To be eligible to undertake a mandatory work placement in a mental health care setting, students may be required to obtain the following specific vocational clearances:

- A Working with Children Clearance (Ochre Card)
- A National Police Check
- Students may also require occupational health screening, including vaccinations.

Students must hold these clearances or be willing to obtain them if required by host work placement organisations.

Students are also required to participate in practical assessments during week 7 of each term, with specific attendance dates and times to be provided at the commencement of each teaching

Students are required to undertake 80 hours of mandatory work placement to complete the qualification. For students already employed in the sector, there may be the opportunity to complete this at their current workplace, however this is subject to approval.

Work placements are arranged by the TAFE Placement Officer in collaboration with the course contact.

Whilst the TAFE Placement Officer will endeavour to place students in a work placement close to their residence, travel may be required


